Need for Comprehensive Policy

Industrial Connection Fee = WW Capacity Reservation

Goals of this process

- Capacity reservation policy compliments
 Nampa's economic development strategy
- The policy is an incentive for industrial development and existing industry expansion
- The policy is designed to maintain the financial integrity of the wastewater fund



Establishing the Baseline of Capacity

Prior to implementing policy, Nampa's "Baseline" Capacity of the wastewater system will need to be established.

- What is the system capacity in relation to the 85% level of service that triggers planning for expansion?
 - Flow and loading usage compared to total capacity
- What capacity has been allocated?
 - Lent to industrial customers, purchased capacity



Research Results: Cursory National Review

Local Incentives/Policies

- This research effort was conducted to discover:
 - Incentive techniques being used by communities throughout the country
 - Whether examples existed that were similar to the potential incentive techniques introduced at the last IWG meeting

Research Results: Idaho Cities Incentive Policies

City of Boise:

- No incentive policies
- Up-front industrial wastewater capacity charges
- Available financing, may require security instrument

City of Caldwell:

- No incentive policies
- Up-front Industrial wastewater capacity charges
- Payment required before building permit is issued

City of Lewiston: Research pending



Research Results: Idaho Cities Incentive Policies

City of Meridian:

 Economic Development Incentives Policy is expected to be drafted in 2012-2013

City of Pocatello:

- No incentive policies
- Up-front industrial wastewater capacity charges
- Payment required before site occupancy

City of Idaho Falls:

 Economic and Community Development Incentive Program – Ordinance No. 2895



Research Results: Idaho Cities Incentive Policies

City of Twin Falls:

- No incentive policies
- Sewer rates may be negotiated
 - G. Group V Industrial (User Code 500): This class of users includes all large volume and industrial process waste dischargers. The monthly fee for this class of users shall be in accordance with the Industrial User Agreement, entered into by each industrial user with the City of Twin Falls for the use of the wastewater system. (The City of Twin Falls may negotiate sewer rates on a contractual basis with major industrial customers.)



Lending wastewater system capacity

- Recall of capacity = no property value of capacity reservation
- No holding charge for reservation without use of capacity
- No cost to industry, risk cost of production interruption



Purchase of wastewater system capacity

- No recall of capacity reservation (no risk to industry)
- Property value of purchased capacity is immediate
- Holding charge for reservation of capacity without use of capacity
- Fixed/predictable cost to industry



- Lease/purchase of wastewater system capacity
 - No recall of capacity according to lease/purchase terms
 - Property value of capacity reservation increases as purchased capacity accumulates
 - Holding charge for reservation of purchased capacity without use of capacity
 - Risk to industry, less risk to City
 - Cash flow orientation



- Tax Abatement
 - Mechanisms for tax abatement
 - Incidence of tax abatement effects
 - General fund
 - Delayed revenue impact and delayed effect of tax abatement
- Transferability of previously purchased capacity reservations



- Pretreatment Options
 - Who pays and who operates?
 - Voluntary Environmental Improvement Bonds



Incentive "Threshold" Issues

- Number of and quality of jobs (minimum level for new average wage)
- Planning and zoning requirements
- Environmental performance (or other policy-related performance goals)

Evaluation and Sunset Provisions

- Specific evaluation of the effect of incentive policies
- Policy expires on designated date unless renewed by City Council
